







## STR & SOR Funding

- Beginning in 2017, California received \$89.4 million over 2 years through the State Targeted Response (STR) grant
  - The STR initially funded the Hub & Spoke System and Tribal MAT Project
- In 2018, California received \$176 million over 2 years through the State Opioid Response (SOR) grant
  - The SOR funded over 30 MAT projects statewide



**\$265 million**

## SOR 2 Funding

- In 2019 Congress approved an additional \$1.5 billion to fund state opioid response efforts.
- In 2020 SAMHSA released the next round of funds for the SOR grant. California will receive \$210 million over 2 years through the grant.
- New flexibility for spending related to treatment of stimulant use disorder

# California's Priorities

## Populations

- Tribal Communities
- Youth
- Individuals experiencing homelessness

## Activities

- Continuing to add new access points for MAT
- Evidence-based treatment for fentanyl, methamphetamine
- Focus on sustainability



## General Requirements

Projects should focus on adding *new* subgrantees rather than funding current contracted organizations

Projects should build flexibility for in-person and virtual convenings, due to COVID-19

Projects should build telehealth infrastructure to deliver treatment and recovery services

Projects should build services based on limited Menu Options

Data will be collected by UCLA and due on a quarterly basis through online portal

Projects providing direct treatment and recovery services will require GPRA interviews




## Hub & Spoke Administrative Entity




### Administrative Entity

Responsible for overseeing grant management, subcontracting with hubs and spokes, payment to hubs and spokes, and ensuring data submission to UCLA

Hubs continue to provide clinical expertise to spokes in their network



### UCLA ISAP

Provides training and TA; collects hub and spoke data
